COVER:

This month's cover is from Len Gibler. It is a map of the cave we know as Sanborn's Cave. Len writes:

The map came to me direct from Larry Matthews that winter of '64. The map carried the unofficial "Wild Man Cave" name, referring to the vigor with which the property owner protected this unique cavern. Indeed, the story goes that trespassers were evicted by force of arms. Not flesh-and-bone arms, either!

At that time, "Fop" Dyer photographed the cave (I got to see a couple of those splendid slides) and Matthews and some other COG/CRF people did the survey. Matthews and I flew over the area in his Cessna, and I photographed it. The pictures are not spectacular, but I still have them. I'd love to see "Pop's" set, though.

At the time of the mapping, the cave was already gated. Shortly thereafter, it was sealed with concrete, and still is, I suppose.

And perhaps thats not all bad, even if it is frustrating to those of us who think of ourselves as responsible cavers. But failing a really bomb-proof system of screening visitors, this very fragile and spectacular Ohio cave might look like the old, utterly vandalized section of Ohio Caverns. For what it's worth, at least we know that there, forbidden, some pristine speleothems are living on.

TRIP REPORTS

ORGAN CAVE - GREENBRIER by Len Gibler

The weekend of February 17th Dale Loftland and I headed to the Greenbrier for a look at part of the Organ Cave system. We stayed at the Greenbrier Grotto's fieldhouse on Friday night, and George Dasher led a large party of us into the commercicial entrance. We did the regular commercial route, looked over the saltpeter works and the old classic "rock organ", but our main destination was the bone room and a bit of photography. The big paleontological feature is the skeleton of a pleistocene porupine, who I'm sure died horribly. I couldn't help reflecting how easily one could get lost in that much cave. You might as well be lost in Mammoth: There's no "lets-try-this-way-out" option. You find THE way. We saw and examined a wide array of beautiful gypsum. A very enjoyable commentary by Dasher greatly enriched our foray.

Sunday we poked around the Friar's Hole system, but didn't do any real caving before heading home. Nice weekend, no?

A CAVE IS NAMED! BREATING SINK CAVE by Greg Erisman

My bother Pat, his wife June, and I returned to Breathing Sink Cave (the cave that was dug open by backhoe as described in the March 1984 Squeaks by Bill Walden) with plans of doing an overland survey to the cave surveyed by the Grotte the previous weekend. But, due to the freezing rain that was falling at the time, we aborted the survey.

After talking the situation over for a while, we decided to go into Breathing Sink and try to take some pictures.

We proceeded down the entrance passage, taking pictures as we went, until we came to the side passage that heads to the upper level section that was discovered by Paul Unger and I the previous weekend. Pat, June and I then went into this upper level section to do some poking. We climbed up into the large room Paul discovered, and while Pat and June rested, I tried to climb a verticle flowstone wall to an obvious lead above, but was stopped about 4 feet from the top. I then climbed back down and watched Pat climb the wall by a different route. He soon reached the passage above, and shouted down that there were people tracks up there. I quickly followed Pat's route up the wall and confirmed what he suspected, that we connected to the cave the Grotto had surveyed the weekend before. Deciding that the lake would prevent us from going out the other entrance, we both climbed back down to rejoin June and do some more poking. Pat soon discovered a new room that has some of the best formations in the cave, where we sat down to eat and admire the view. We then proceeded to a level I had noticed earlier, checked it out, and soon found ourselves in the other cave again! Since this second connection route was much easier, we all went through it and toured

some big passage awhile, before heading back for the surface.

FROM THE OHIO DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES



CAVE RESCUE OPERATIONS AND MANAGEMENT AT WILD CAVE NATIONAL PARK Hot Springs, South Dakota June 17 through June 23, 1984. This seminar will be composed of extensive class



and field work in all phases of cave and underground rescue. The course is designed to provide that most current and competent techniques to those agencies, groups and individuals with a serious interest in underground rescue. Subjects to be covered include The Underground Environment, Organization and Management, Communications Systems, Medical Management, Hauling Systems, Extrication, plus much more. The class size will be strictly limited to 60 students to ensure maximum learning opportunity and hands-on experience with the foremost technical equipment available. A special session will provide review and instruction in Basic Vertical Techniques for those who wish to learn or polish up old skills. Basic caving skills are a minimum requirement for the course.

MINUTES MARCH 1984 MEETING

The March 10, 1984 meeting of the COG was held at the home of Jake and Kathy Elberfeld.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Paul Unger.

The Treasurer, Karen Walden, reported \$318.07 in the treasury. A total off \$55 was collected in dues in February and \$15 more was collected before the meeting.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Squeaks Committe: Bill Walden requested cover material for the Squeaks. Anything submitted must be easy to Xerox. He also asked for articles and asked that everyone check the date on the mailing label to be sure their dues have been recorded. He is planning a surprise for the April cover. The subject of selling the press was brought up again. After discussion it was decided to keep it because if it is needed again it would cost too much to replace. (A working used offset press would cost in excess of \$2,000. We paid \$150 in an incredible bargin 12 years ago. The COG press is an AB Dick 320 offset. It does require repair and a willing operator. This press is capable of excellent quality reproduction. Any operators out there? Ed.)

Membership Committee: Jim Blankenship had nothing to report. The April Squeaks will have a list of paid up members. Paul Unger suggested keeping a ledger of membership dues paid.

Safety Committee: There was nothing to report.

Old Business: There was none brought up.

New Business: Mike Gray brought up the issue of where the cave vandalism signs should be posted. Bill Walden read the article accopanying the picture of the sign which stated the purpose of it is to post them in the lobby of commercial caves. It was suggested the COG contact the owners of Ohio Caverns and Olentangy Indian Caverns about posting the signs.

Trip Reports: Bruce Warthman told of his trip with Doc Docherty's group to a cave in the Big Sink area. The cave was discovered in November 1983. They found many nice formations and surveyed to a lower level ending in a waterfall and water passage. They suggest pushing it in wetsuits to connect to Big Sink Cave upstream.

Paul Unger told more about the cave he and Greg Erisman were in. They reported it is a big cave with lots of formations. Bill is sending the owner complimentary copies of the Squeaks.

Len Gibbler told about his trip to the Organ Hendrick system. The editor of the West Virginia Caver, George Dasher, led the trip. It had everything from canyons to belly crawls. There were many gypsum needles and flowers.

Paul Unger brought up the possibility of exchange visits with other grottos. He suggested a weekend of caving in Kentucky and hopefully they would reciprocate. After a discussion, the consensus was that it is a good idea. Bill made a motion to do it, Chuck Daehnke seconded the motion. Paul will start contacting the other grottoes.

It was also brought up that Greg Erisman is the member in charge of keeping the Suunto Compass and level.

The meeting was then adjourned. The April meeting will be at home of Dale and Sandy Harmon on Friday, April 13.
