### Indian Trail Caverns

Returning from a business trip to Fostoria, Ohio, I noticed this little cave indicated on the map. Fortunately, my appointment in Fostoria didn't last long, so I drove off through the side roads, and located the cave and its owner, Jim Hendrix. He and a small crew were at work readying the cave for visitors. And, he very kindly offered to take me through.

The cave is wholly phreatic in origin, with passages and rooms meandering erratically through sharply cross-bedded dolomite. At several points, karst windows open in the ceiling of the rooms in the cave. A few stubs of stalactites can be seen.

Many smoke smudges are to be found in this cavern, and interbedded in glacial debris, Jim claims to have found firepits. By his reckoning, these pits were overlain by affluvium of the Wisconsin glaciation, placing them at 25,000 years of age or older. He told me of bones and skulls that he has found. It all makes an intriguing story, with a decided spicy, mysterious quality about it. If you're in the area it's worth your time to check this area out. Mr. Hendrix's story is quite credible. One is left to wonder. And, that's nice.

### Camp's Gulf Cave and Indian Grave Point Cave

Thanksgiving Weekend was loaded with Tennessee caving again for me and my AYH friends.

This trip was led by Ron Eisle, with ten of us split into two more manageable groups. On Friday, Ron and three others of us did the Big One in Camp's Gulf again. This cave is to me everything that a cave was in my early childhood fantasies. It simply fills me with awe.

Ron knew I would soon be wanting to take some other through Camp's (you COG'ers have a real treat in store) so he kindly offered to let me lead through the titanic breakdown maze that has sealed the cave off for so many years. It baffled me many times, even though I've been in it quite a few times. Everywhere I poked did not just look familiar, it was familiar: I'd been lost there many times.

The cave is beyond scale. This trip I sat down near the summit of the breakdown mountain in the middle-sized room. I was steaming so badly I couldn't see well for the clouds, so I turned out my light. The others were separated, poking around various parts of the room. As my eyes adjusted to the dark, more and more of the room came into view. Streaks of light from my friends' head lamps slowly became more discernable as they swept the beautifully symmetrical vault of this huge chamber. The outline of the flanks of the mountain came first into profile, and as my eyes continued to adapt, faint details began to show in the shadows. This giant room began to reveal itself to me. It was awesome, yet it was only the middle room.

We explored to the end of the big sump passage, where evidence of high spring flooding was everywhere. The way back through the breakdown was relatively simple, this time.

Saturday, all ten of us descended on Indian Grave Point Cave. This cave is heavily visited, and unfortunately, loaded with trash and graffiti. Still, it's very interesting, with a kind of Schoolhouse vertical development, in miniature, of course. (Schoolhouse Cave in West Virginia is well known for its many difficult climbs. --ED) The up-and-down stuff required some rigging, so things were pretty slow with a party that large. Still, the high vantage points and overlooks were dramatic and picturesque. We took 11 hours to do about three miles of cave, however. This cave is very difficult to navigate in, so it can provide a lot of challenge. A good trip awaited.

Dear Bill

As a current officer of the OVR, I'm writing you for two reasons. One, to provide information from the last OVR meeting; and two, to ask for your help in giving information back to the OVR Board, so we can act on items discussed at the last meeting. We need input from the member Grottos, so we can do what they want us to do. ...

... the OVR is going back to a dues paying system. ... In addition the Editor needs information. ... Send copy (of Squeaks) to the OVC Editor. ...

Also, please draft or elect an OVR Reporter from your grotto to be responsible for sending information to the OVR Editor. It doesn't have to be a "tough" job, just let her know what projects your grotto's doing currently. We need some sharing of interests if the member Grottos are ever going to get more familiar with each other. That was the OVR can start performing like a Region: working to help us all. Please provide the name of Your Grotto's Reporter on the enclosed sheet, using the stamped, addressed envelope to get it back to me.

Second, a motion was made, and seconded, two meetings ago to print up a lot of adhesive-backed labels containing Cave Rescue Phone Numbers for both Indiana and Kentucky. These could be given to each grotto to pass around to places where the majority of cavers would get them. The main target would be un-affiliated cavers, who would be least likely to know who to call in an emergency. Each grotto would get 500 to 1000 of these labels, depending on their size. Here's the rub! That many labels would cost the DVR about \$400. If your grotto could provide a donation of around \$20, we could do this. For this donation, your grotto would get about a 1000 labels.

I know giving money isn't popular, but this is a chance to provide a real service to the caving community. There've been many instances where problems have been slow to resolve, because no one knew who to call. These labels will contain the words "24 HOUR CAVE RESCUE". The state names of INDIANA and KENTUCKY will be in bold print with their respective phone numbers. At the minimum, the first name/number for each state will be their STATE POLICE number. Both are toll free and, therefore, more likely to be called. More networks to contact the designated cave rescue organization. The proper group would therefore be called early in the emergency, not last, as usually happens when the local police or firemen are called first.

If your grotto is willing to take up a donation and contribute, please make note on the attached sheet to be returned to me. There's also room there for comments. We welcome your thoughts on anything. If we get enough pledges to help financially with the label project, we'll do it. Otherwise, we won't. It just costs too much for the DVR Treasury to do it (We currently have less than \$30).

The above letter was shortened but the important parts were included. I had handed the above letter to Paul Unger to discuss at the December meeting. However, the December meeting is not a good one to discuss business. Everyone is interested in the food and gift exchange. I therefore responded to Gary's letter since we did not have time to wait till the January meeting. I told Gary that I didn't think the COG would be interested in the sticker program. My reasoning was that non-affiliated cavers probably would not pay any attention to information from the NSS (Otherwise they would have joined the NSS or an NSS Grotto.) and that the COG could produce the labels themselves for less money. If you don't agree with my reasoning, then take up a collection for the stickers. Bill Walden

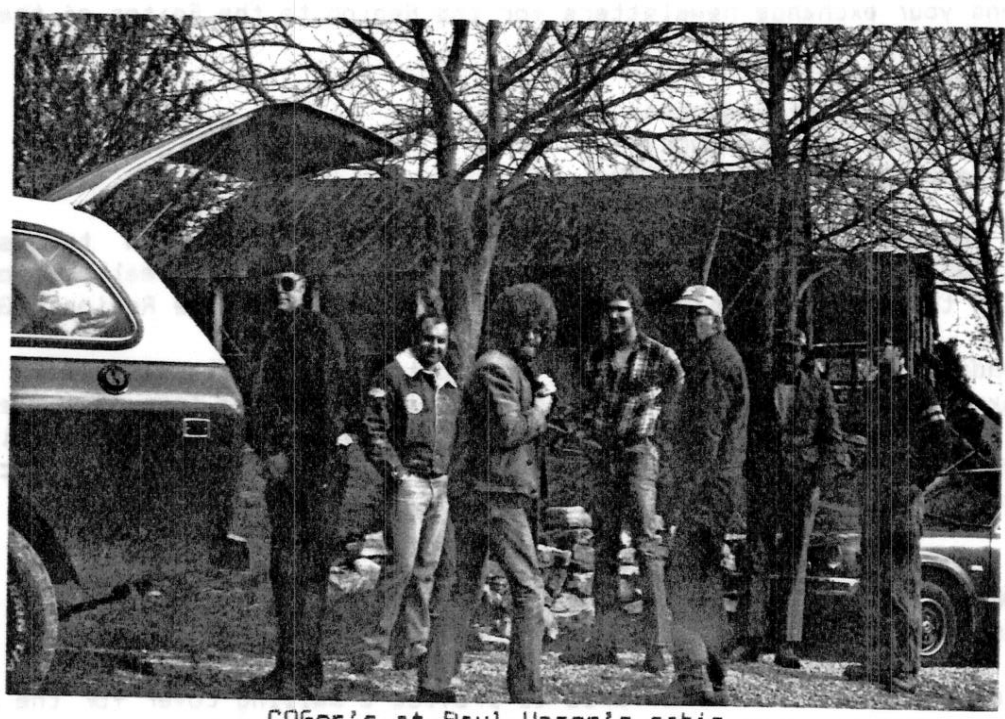
I received your catalogs which will be distributed to COG members. Thank you very much for sending them to our grotto. Hopefully, you'll see some new business out of Ohio.

## Ed Potter's Journal

Alex and the two scouts begin pulling again but Ed has reached the lowest point. The incline on the rope must be about 60 degrees now and the pullers have over 80 per cent of Ed's weight plus friction to overcome. Its tiring work and they rest more frequently now.

"I have a better idea!" shouts Calvin. He ties off the rope behind the Gibbs and starts to put on his vertical equipment. Calvin has a scout tie a length of webbing from his chest sling to the rock behind them. He then attaches the ascenders to the haul rope. Now the scouts pull the rope tight behind the safety Gibbs and Calvin starts to climb. Slowly with deliberate 6 inch steps Calvin uses the Gibbs ascenders to pull Ed up the incline. Calvin finds it no harder than if he were indeed climbing the rope.

Finally Ed is above the floor of the stream passage and the five let out a cheer. Calvin pumps a little faster now. Ed finally arrives at the ceiling.

"Now what?" Inquires Ed.

Alex climbs up onto the rocks. "Ed see if you can unclip yourself from the traverse line when I lift you."

"OK." Replies Ed.

Alex lifts with all his might and Ed manages to unclip the safety carabiner. Alex relaxes and straightens. "Let's try again Ed." Again Alex lifts Ed and Ed manages to unclip from the pulley. The stretcher shifts position and swings from the haul line.

"Relax a bit." Alex tells Ed.

He walks back to the rock to which the haul line is tied.

"I'll just cut the rope and you'll be down in a jiffy!"

"Don't you dare..." Ed starts to reply before he realizes that Alex is joking. "This is no time to joke. I hate ropes."

Calvin took out his rack and fixed it to the rock but well behind the Gibbs safety. The haul line was run through the rack. Next the two scouts pull with all they have while Calvin releases and removes the Gibbs. Finally he pulls up the slack in the rope behind the rack and tells the scouts to let go. Ed lurches downward then begins a slow smooth descent as Calvin feeds the rope through the rack.

"Well that's the easy part. Now to get you up and out of this passage." Turning to the scouts "Take this rope and rig a line from the bottom to the top of the boulder drop." Instructs Alex.

The scouts pick up their gear and the remaining rope and depart.

"This is a hell of a cave you've found Ed. We'd like to help survey it. Its to big for one Grotto to handle." offers Calvin.

Ed hesitated then replied "suspect we will require some help on this one."

Alex looked up to see the line bouncing. "The others must be ready to come up now."

Going to the drop off Calvin could see John Winters starting to make his way up the rope. Looks rather strange to see a man climbing a rope that was far from vertical. The squadman must have had practice for he made his way quickly to the top.

Alex called to his scouts below to give some slack.

Now working the Gibbs manually, John inched his way to the floor beside Ed.

The rigging was quickly removed, put into the pack and sent down for the next person.

Calvin and John moved Ed away from the rig point. One of the two scouts was now making his way up the rope with most of the gear that was used below. Once up he sent the pack with the ascenders back down for the last scout.

The rope, now untied from the rock below, hung nearly vertically into the near empty plunge pool. The last person up the rope had a normal climb to the stream passage. While he unrigged, the others pulled up the rope which had his pack and the rest of the rigging tied to the end.

"Wise guy! The rest of us carried our packs up with us. We have to pull your's up for you!" Cracked the one scout to his friend. "Well, I'm not as tired as you." The other quipped back. "Besides, I needed some weight on the end of the rope. No one to give me tension, you know!"

Ropes, webbing, carabiners, and other supplies seemed to more than fill the packs. The five rescuers looked at their supplies then at Ed who knew what they must be thinking.

Alex delegated the supply packs to the two scouts. Then John and Calvin picked up the stretcher. The going is easy at first. Alex trades off with John after a while then John with Calvin. As they travelled they continued to rotate. At the base of the boulder run they meet the other two scouts. They have done their job. A rope runs from the ceiling up over the boulders.

"Time to rest, change carbide, and eat." Hollers Ed. "I'm hungry. Lets eat here at the base of Alfies Tumble."

Nothing more need be said. It was a long haul in and an exhausting traverse across the plunge pool. What little food remained is distributed among all. Ed looked uneasily up Alfies Tumble. From the bottom it looked like an endless jumble of boulders stretching up and out of sight.

Calvin on seeing Ed's apprehension didn't help much when he said "This will be more difficult and dangerous than the waterfall was. Not only will we have to get Ed up this rockpile but ourselves."

It is decided to run a belay line up the hill to the top. Two of the scouts will belay the team. Ed in his stretcher will be clipped front and aft to the taunt line. The Belay line is attached to the front of the stretcher. The remaining five will work Ed up Alfies Tumble.

Alex decides to examine the route before starting. In places the rope is far above the boulders and into the boulders in other places. He can see no way to improve the routing of the rope but it occurs to him that there might be a place that, even with Ed's weight on the rope, he might be out of reach of the carriers. Alex decides to have the scouts at the top use a Gibbs safety as at the waterfall.

Returning to the bottom Alex dispatches a third scout to the top to help rig a Gibbs safety and help pull on the belay line.

All is ready at last and with a great heave-ho Ed is lifted to the rope and clipped on to it.

With the Scouts above pulling and Alex and Calvin quidding, Ed slides up the rope.

"This is more fun than the waterfall room." Guips Ed.

Sweat streams off Alex and Calvin. After but a short distance John switches with Calvin and then Calvin with Alex. The worry, the climb, and the fact that they are now nearing exhaustion is showing.

Ed is now beyond reach and the scouts are doing well as they ease Ed closer to the top. Ed finds that he must help by pushing his stretcher clear of boulders and protrusions from the wall.

Now Ed is down in the rocks and the line is of little help. Alex, Calvin and John have to thread Ed through a path they would not have chosen. At times Ed is nearly out of reach between huge house sized boulders. The scouts continue to pull easily while Ed, and his rescuers thread through the passage of boulders.

They become aware of some excitement of somekind at the top. The pull from the top now seems somehow more sure and strong. Sensing this, Ed, Calvin, Alex and John move more surely now. Their progress is faster.

"Alfie!" Shouts Alex as he see more people at the top of Alfie's Tumble. Ed turns his head hard to see his friend but the pain is to great. "Hurry up you klutzes." mutters Ed. As they approach the top Alfie and two of the local cavers come down to to relieve the three tired rescuers. Alex, John and Calvin collapse on the slop while the three fresh cavers rush Ed to the top.

Ed turns and now looks at his friend. "You look awful!" "Yeah, all the bruises show now." responds Alfie. "The doctors gave me a clean bill of health though. They gave me a knock out pill to make me sleep. Don't know how long I slept but they said I was free to go when I woke up. I called Billman and he had these guys pick me up." Alfie said motioning to the new cavers at Ed's side. "Bought some food for you-all." Pointing to some clean packs. "Well, aren't you interested?"

The rescuers were weary. Only slowly did they approach the supply packs. Alfie snatched one up and opening it he produced a beer for Ed.

"Thanks Alfie."

Ed gulped the beer down then indicated that he was ready to move. The newcomers picked up the stretcher and continued the journey.

Alex and the others found they were extremely thirsty. Alfie had brought plenty of water but no beer. After quenching their thirst they discovered the food.

"I'm going back to get the others." Alfie said to the rest of the rescue party.

Alfie dropped back down to the stream passage and took off at a jog down stream to find Alex.

On the noise that awaited Alfie at the top of the boulder strewn drop off. Hesitating, Alfie decided to change his carbide and grab a piece of chicken that remained. Then with a sigh he shouted "Time to wake up. Got to get Ed out of here. You all can rest outside the Cave!"

Slowly working Ed from side to side and changing the position of the stretcher in the crevice, the rescuers inched Ed up toward the top.

The rescue squad, now alert to the fact that the rescue team in the cave was approaching, entered the cave.

Clearing the top of the crevice, Ed was shocked to see clean white coveralls! The squadsmen now took over and the trip out the remaining distance was quick. "Too easy", thought Ed to himself. "How did these guys get in with out getting dirty?"

No one replied. But as Ed ascended to the pasture above, Ed caught sight of the equipment. The entrance had been bulldozed clear and a dam built across the stream.

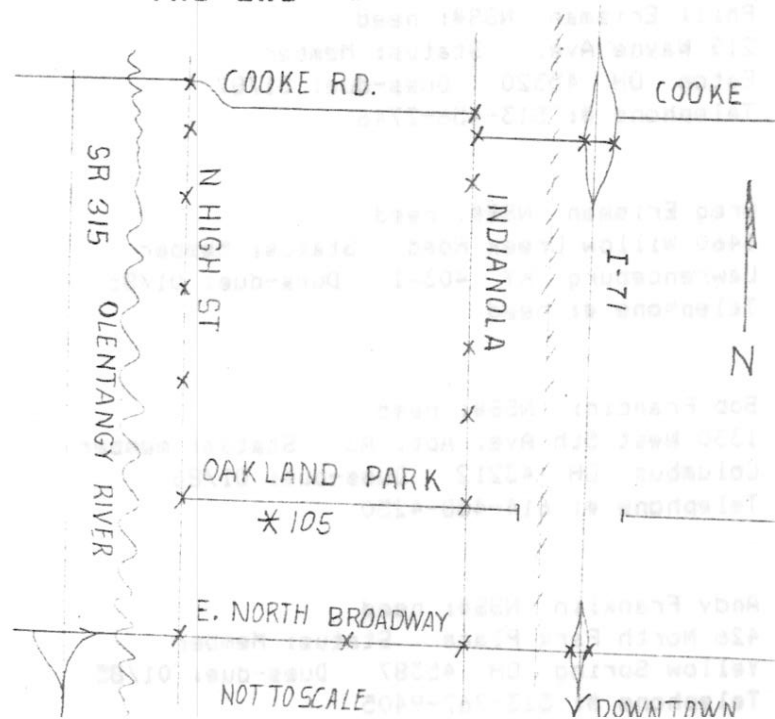
As Ed stared at the construction equipment, he became aware of a gentle shaking on his arm.
