The Cavern

or

How I lost My Naivete About Spelunking by Bill Hunnicutt

"Normal" people enjoy fresh air, sunshine, and the wide open spaces. At least I thought so.

That was until I was cordially invited to explore the realm of Minton

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Hollow Cave by my new neighbors, Bill, Karen, and Katie Walden. I am still unsure about the actual enticement they used — could it have been their glowing description of "Paul's Cabin," or the repeated statements about mud, water and total darkness, or perhaps the comments about the variety of people one finds in the Central Ohio Grotto of the NSS? I only know that I was, and am impressed with the Waldens, and those of their Spelunking friends I have been privileged to meet.

In any case - we (the Waldens and I) arrived at "Paul's Cabin" (perhaps Paul is trying to preserve a bit of Early American plumbing) at about 1:30 in the morning. It was still in the 80's with high humidity, and I wasn't able to get to sleep until about 4. But at 6:30, we were all up and raring to go. We joined some others interested in exploring the dark recesses of Minton Hollow, had breakfast, and after a chat with the Crocketts (I was told that they are descendants of Davey), prepared to enter the cave.

I wasn't ready for the long walk in 90 degree heat with all of the paraphernalia I had acquired for my Assault on Minton. We finally arrived at the <u>cool</u> entrance. The next day, we made another assault on the cave from the Garbage Pit entrance (appropriately named). This gave me yet another viewpoint to caving, owing to the different nature of this area of the cave system. I was privately pleased that my worn out 43 year old body was able to keep up with most of the folks, and I was especially glad that a 26 year old young hero decided not to enter the second day.


My hat is off to Cavers! I have come through safely, and ... \underline{I} SHALL RETURN !!!
